Blindness can't sack Pottstown running back

Pottstown's Marvin Pearson (#28) started losing his sight at eight and was completely blind two years later. During that time, he inexplicably also lost his hearing. Now, at 18, he is a senior at Pottstown High School after spending three years at the Overbrook School for the Blind, and plays football. He scored a 65-yard touchdown and two-point conversion in recent games - by Kathy Boccella, Staff Writer - Philadelphia Inquirer.

A touchdown for fans of any team will stand and cheer for!

It's easy to see football at Pottstown High School is a team sport. Everything has to line up just right for the perfect play like a much-needed touchdown, during a homecoming game.

"Everybody was yellin, Marvin! Let's go Marvin!" remembers Sophomore Dominique Durant.

Marvin Pearson was the guy who made the touchdown that night. He's clearly a star, well-loved by his fellow students. That's easy to see. What you do not see at first, is that Marvin can't see. Marvin's Story...

Marvin lost his sight at 10 years old. "You know, that's the only time I ever cried," Marvin tells us.

But he says, what frustrated him, drove him. "It mentally helped me mature," he says.

When Marvin wanted play football, Coach Gary Rhodenbaugh Jr. signed him up.

His teammates, embraced it, embraced him. Which leads to the big moment - the homecoming game.

Things weren't going too well for Pottstown. They were down 48 to 0, when the rival coach across the field, had an idea. "He said, 'Listen, you know, if you want to give Marvin that opportunity to run the football, we would love to be a part of that," Coach Rhodenbaugh says.

"I hit the right side of the hole and as soon as I got past our offensive linemen, I just exploded!" Marvin tells us.

This could be the end to our story, a fairy tale touchdown for the guy who'd never had one before. But Marvin said he wasn't sure he wanted that moment.

"I'm sure people are going to remember me as a blind person playing football. But I'd like to be remembered as a football player playing football," he admits.

But that night, his coach reminded him, "I said, you know Marvin, I think this is a sign of respect," he says.

Maybe it wasn't with the guys were going to do for him but instead their way of saying thank you for what Marvin does for them.

"I look at him more as a leader," says Durant.

"He's always on the side, cheering us on, and everything," Junior Austin Andrews says.

He has a vision, his whole team looks up to.

"This isn't any ordinary football team. This is a family, that's the only way to put it," Marvin says.

And just like that, everything in football lines up.

Acting Superintendent Stephen Rodriguez presented Marge with his monthly Superintendent's Award.



Teacher who inspired me: I consider my father my best and most inspiring teacher for the lessons he taught me on the value of hard work, perseverance and sense of duty for family and country. As far as in school, my fourth-grade teacher, Dave Uhas, really impacted me. He made learning and being in school fun and helped me mature as a young man. His dedication and enthusiasm are some of the biggest reasons I wanted to be, and now am, a fourth-grade teacher.

What I find most meaningful about teaching fourth-graders: It is so rewarding to work with fourth-graders because they are starting to mature and are ready to accept responsibility in their education and around the school. Since they are the oldest in the school, they are asked to be leaders. Whether they are showing younger students the proper way to walk in the hallway or how to be patient in line, I encourage them to be role models.

Funniest classroom moment: One of the funnier moments of my teaching career happened at my first faculty meeting. I was sitting at a student desk getting ready for the principal to introduce me to the rest of the staff. Just before she called my name for me stand up and greet the staff, my grade-level partner, Mrs. Alutius, knocked her coffee cup over spilling it across the desk and down the front of my shirt and pants. It really lightened the mood for me.

If I weren't an educator, I'd be: Since I am such a big sports fan, I always thought that a career in sports management or sports medicine would suit me. I've been involved in team sports all my life and would enjoy the opportunity to help put athletes in position to succeed and achieve their goals on the field.

You might not know: I was actually accepted to the University of Pittsburgh with a major in engineering and spent three years in the mechanical engineering department. In high school, I was really good at math and science, so I assumed that engineering was a good path to follow. As much as I enjoyed that program, I finally realized that it was not my passion. In high school and college, I spent my summers working as a summer playground coordinator in Pottsgrove and loved working with kids. I decided to make a change for my future. I'm so glad I decided to pursue teaching as a career.



Of those, 24 students will be competing at the DECA state conference in Hershey, Pennsylvania. The competition involved students taking a 100 question content based test and situational role play. The top six contestants in individual categories and the top four teams in team events move on to the state competition held in Hershey, Pennsylvania. Students' role playing is judged on how well they adjust to the various business situations that are presented to them.

This year's recipients included:

<u>Dr. Richard Frerichs</u> - Class of 1960 - Dr. Frerichs is a Millersville University professor emeritus, the Vice-Chair of the Millersville University Council of Trustees and the 2014 President of the Pennsylvania School Boards Association. Rich pursued a teaching degree at Millersville State College, now Millersville University, graduating in December of 1963. His first teaching job was in the Neshaminy School District where he taught Biology and coached track and cross-country. In 1968 Rich returned to Millersville University as the assistant Dean of Men and cross-country and track coach. During his tenure at Millersville he held a variety of academic and administrative positions before retiring in 2004 as the chair of the department of Educational Foundations, the department that prepares teachers at Millersville University. He received his doctorate from the University of Delaware. As recognition of his commitment to the students and mission of Millersville University he was named Person of the Year by the Student Senate and in 2012 he was awarded the President's Medallion. He was the Public Address voice of Millersville University football for over 40 years and the voice of women's basketball for over 30 years. After his retirement, he was inducted into the Millersville University Athletic Hall of Fame. Since retiring from Millersville University Rich has remained active in the educational arena and is often called upon to testify before the State House and Senate committees on educational issues.

- Mr. Augustus "Barney" Levengood Class of 1972 Since 1991, Mr. Levengood has been the Executive Director of the Indiana Convention Center and Lucas Oil Stadium. Lucas Oil Stadium is home of the 2006 World Champion Indianapolis Colts. Mr. Levengood oversaw the \$103 million expansions to both the convention center and stadium which is estimated to have brought over \$2.25 billion into the Indianapolis economy, while supporting over 74,000 jobs in central Indiana. In addition to this site, Mr. Levengood helped to manage Bankers Life Field House, home of the Indiana Pacers, and Toledo, Ohio's SeaGate Centre. Previously, he was the director of building and client services at the Baltimore Convention Center and director of operations at the Baltimore Civic Arena. He also worked at Towson University managing the arena, stadium, and student union building. After graduating from PHS, Mr. Levengood attended East Stroudsburg and later learned a Masters of Arts degree from Ohio University. He is a member of the Indiana Society of Association Executives, International Association of Exposition Managers, Religious Conference Management association, International Association of Assembly Managers and Stadium Managers Association.
- Mr. Michael V. Fisher Class of 1975 Mr. Fisher is a creative professional with over 30 years of experience in the retail industry with a focus on branding, marketing, and visual display design. After graduating from high school, Mr. Fisher attended Temple University's Tyler School of Art where he earned a Bachelors of Fine Arts in painting. Upon graduating from Temple, he worked as an illustrator and fashion designer in New York City. This position lead to designing window displays for retail stores. Mr. Fisher's career includes several years in the visual department of Bloomingdales, where he rose to creative director. As Bloomingdale's creative director, he was responsible for the chain's window and store displays. Fisher's daring use of women's fashion alongside color-coordinated Apple computers, lead to a job offer from Steve Jobs to oversee merchandising and store design for Apple. His minimalist approach to store design, marketing, and visual merchandising came to define Apple stores worldwide. In addition to Senior Creative Director at Apple, Mr. Fisher has also held the position of Senior Vice President for Marketing at Ralph Lauren's Club Monaco division, Chief Creative Officer at JC Penney and oversaw Coach's retail expansion in to Japan. - ❖ Tracey Wright Class of 1982 Wright was a football and wrestling star at Pottstown High School. He was a dynamic athlete with a distinctive flair. In football he would block a kick or create a fumble or recover one when it was most needed or he would pin his opponent in wrestling to get his team fired up. In football he was selected All-Ches-Mont his junior and senior seasons at defensive end. He was chosen to play in the Montgomery County All-Star game and was Honorable Mention All-State. He won several tournaments in wrestling his junior and senior seasons, and medaled in the Sectional, District, and Regional tournaments. After graduating from PHS in 1982, he moved on to Kutztown, where he flourished. The defensive end was named All-PSAC three years. In 1985, he was named All-American Honorable Mention, was ECAC Honor Roll three times and ECAC Player of the Week against Shippensburg and East Stroudsburg. He is still the all-time leader in sacks with 25.5, and in 2015 was named to Kutztown's 100th season all-time team as well as being inducted into KU's Athletics Hall of Fame.
- Greg Glenn, Jr. Class of 1986 Glenn starred in football and basketball at Pottstown High School. He played defensive back and quarterback for the Trojans. He was team captain and led his team to the final victory for the Trojans in the Ches-Mont League over OJR on Thanksgiving Day. He was point guard on the hoops team, leading the Trojans to a 19-4 record his senior season, including a double OT win over powerhouse Coatesville. He was the PHS Outstanding Athlete his senior year. Glenn went to Kutztown University for football after graduation where he played defensive back, running back and returned kickoffs. Over his four-year KU career, Glenn earned 3 ECAC weekly honor roll awards. He was second in tackles his senior year and led in interceptions. After graduation he played 6 years for the BuxMont Bulldogs, guiding them to a 14-0 championship season in 1995. He also currently is a PIAA varsity official in football and basketball.
- ❖ Shannon Witzel Class of 2003 -Witzel was a three-sport standout at Pottstown High School. She played field hockey, basketball, and her best sport, lacrosse. She helped her basketball team win the District 1 championship, helped a downtrodden field hockey team return to respectability and led her lacrosse squad to several wins and accomplishments. She finished with 200 career goals and memorably scored 15 goals in a game and rallied her team from 7-0 down to score eight straight goals for a win. Witzel then went to Towson University to play lacrosse where she was Rookie of the Year by scoring 44 goals and 53 total points. She led the nation with 3.74 goals per game her sophomore season, and set the Towson record with 71 goals. She scored seven goals in the CAA championship game against Hofstra. As a junior, she ranked 4th in scoring per game with 3.59 and was named First Team CAA, and Third Team All-American. After another productive year as a senior, Witzel finished tied for career goals with 208, and was honored Towson's Sr. Female Athlete of the Year. After graduating she started a coaching career at Towson, then went to LaSalle, now to her current position at Cincinnati University with fellow PHS graduate (and Tri-County Hall of Famer) Regina Oliver.
