

#### Rodriguez still fighting for more level-up school funding



Although the core of Pennsylvania's state budget has been adopted, still to be resolved is the matter of "level up" funding for the state's 100 poorest school districts which, for Pottstown Schools, meant more than \$1 million in state funding last year. So, while trying to get the district ready for another school year, Superintendent Stephen Rodriguez made time to make his way to Harrisburg Aug. 10 to testify before the House Education Committee about

why that extra funding is needed, and the benefits previous "level-up" funding is already providing to Pottstown students.

When the bus company that provides transportation for some of our students unexpectedly reduced the number of routes that they provided, it caused concern for both students and parents. Superintendent Stephen Rodriguez immediately called a Town Hall meeting to hear concerns and brainstorm solutions. Within a matter of days, he was able to work with the transportation company and various community organizations to reestablish additional transportation options for students. Students who ride the fare paying bus must now sign a three strike and your off contract.












## Barth students get a feel for and taste of history




## Student Athletes Must Earn the Privilege to Play

The Marketing class at Pottstown High School hosted the grand launch of the Marketing Trojan




## The 45<sup>th</sup> Annual Tri County Area Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame

Congratulations to Trojan alumni, **Kasey (Mock) Eckroth** and **Willis Whitehurst** who were inducted into the Tri-County Area Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame.

Kasey (Mock) Eckroth – PHS Class of 2010 – During her outstanding career at Pottstown HS (2007-2010) she set the PAC girls' lacrosse record with 318 goals, with 119 coming in her senior season. She was The Mercury Lacrosse Player of the Year in 2010, and All Philly Area 1<sup>st</sup> Team. She then got a full scholarship to Syracuse University where she was a standout on defense. She helped the Orange win the Big East Championship in 2013, and they made three Final Fours. She was named the following year at SU: All Academic Big East (2011-13), All Academic ACC (2014), and 2<sup>nd</sup> Team All ACC (2014). After college she played on the U.S. Women's National Team (2014-15). She has since coached Lax at various levels including high school and college.



Willis Whitehurst – PHS Class of 1982 – He was an outstanding all-around athlete at Pottstown HS before graduating in 1982. He earned 9 letters (4 baseball/3 football/2 basketball). 


