
Smallwood/Watson Bring Home State Medal

Pottstown School District's Music Education Program Receives National Recognition

Pottstown School District has been honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from The NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education, for the 6th year in a row. Now in its 22nd year, the Best Communities for Music Education designation is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide music access and education to all students.

To qualify for the Best Communities designation, Pottstown answered detailed questions about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, support for the music program and community music-making programs. Responses were verified with school officials and reviewed by The Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas.

Since the passage by Congress in 2015 of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and a stated emphasis on a well-rounded education, many school districts have re-committed to music and arts education programs and found that in this time of a national pandemic, provides a valuable way to keep students engaged in school. ESSA provides designated funding for well-rounded educational opportunities through Title IV Part A Student Academic Success and Achievement grants. NAMM Foundation research has revealed that these grants are being widely used by school districts to address instructional gaps in access to music and arts education.

Research into music education continues to demonstrate educational/cognitive and social skill benefits for children who make music: After two years of music education, researchers found that participants showed more substantial improvements in how the brain processes speech and reading scores than their less-involved peers and that students who are involved in music are not only more likely to graduate high school, but also to attend college as well. Everyday listening skills are stronger in musically trained children than in those without music training. Significantly, listening skills are closely tied to the ability to: perceive speech in a noisy background, pay attention, and keep sounds in memory. Later in life, individuals who took music lessons as children show stronger neural processing of sound: young adults and even older adults who have not played an instrument for up to 50 years show enhanced neural processing compared to their peers. Not to mention, social benefits include conflict resolution, teamwork skills, and how to give and receive constructive criticism.

A CONVERSATION WITH CARING CYBER CHARTER SCHOOL PARENTS

I'd like to share a personal experience with you and point out a few lessons I learned.

About a week ago, I had an opportunity to speak with parents who have been sending their children to cyber charter school for many years. They are wonderful people who are family-oriented and

great advocates for their children. They were former homeschoolers and highly engaged with their five children's education. These children are active in sports, the arts, get straight A's and take advanced courses. Any one of them could be used as a poster child for what is right and good about cyber charter school.

Yes, you read that correctly folks; you don't have to reread it.

I digress. The purpose of the conversation was that mom had concerns with the curriculum being taught to one child. She outlined some of those concerns and how

the teacher was implementing the curriculum. It was a valid concern. I gave her the typical advice. Reach out to the teacher and share your concerns, reach out to the principal if that doesn't work. All educational environments that are healthy will seek out feedback and be responsive to your issues.

We quickly moved past that and into this mother's desire to run for school board. She wanted to devote some time to make things better for her younger children. She asked me how to do that, and when I informed her that cyber charter school boards are not elected but rather appointed, both mom and dad were aghast. She then asked about the public school in the municipality for which she lived (not in my district). When I told her that the two were completely unrelated and the public school has zero influence or accountability powers over their cyber charter school, again they were aghast!

Then, the questions came at a rapid pace. Our cyber charter school tells us they get less money than public schools and public schools lie all the time to protect unions; is that right? We thought that cyber charter school requirements were the same as a public school. What do you mean cyber charter schools hire private companies? How is it legal for them to make a profit off taxpayer dollars? School choice: You are against school choice, aren't you? I

thought all public educators were against school choice, right? What is Future Ready Index? What is school performance profile? What is the Fair Funding Formula? Why would a cyber charter school have less than 100% of teachers certified?

Taxpayer dollars pay for those radio commercials? Those billboards? Those Internet ads,T-shirts, school bags, and TV spots? Cyber charters can keep the money they don't use? They get pandemic relief money? That's not okl.

This wonderful couple walked away with a very different and better informed view of the complicated state of education. What are the chances they won't share this new-found knowledge with others? Slim.



Lessons Learned:

- Most parents, most citizens are far less informed than we realize.
- Many people are not informed by newspaper articles or school board meetings.
- Dialogue takes time; it's inefficient, but it is equally long-lasting and effective at informing parents and citizens.
- This conversation did not happen in my office or at a basketball game. It's also not the first time I've had such conversations with parents. As a devout Christian, people from totally different points of view from mine on education will engage me because of that commonality.
- We all have such commonalities. Use them!

June 29th, 2021 Press Conference Statement - Governor Wolf - Level Up Legislation

Good Morning. On behalf of the Pennsylvania League of Urban Schools, a caucus of PASA, and on behalf of the Pottstown School District, I would like to thank you, Rep. Mike Schlossberg, other esteemed members of our state legislature, Governor Tom Wolf, and the growing community of education advocates who helped to support this education funding.

Several months ago, when I was asked to speak on behalf of this proposed legislation, I said that Level Up legislation falls far short of a fully funded fair funding formula.

However, I also said that this funding may not be a touchdown, but it is a solid 'first down' because it addresses some of the inequity in our current funding structure. It is a solid 'first down' and ensures that students who need this funding most, get it first.

The way you get touchdowns and eventually win games is a series of first downs. SO WE CAN"T STOP HERE. Continual positive progress down the field of play wins the game for our students and our state.

Some of you may know that just last week dozens of advocates were arrested while protesting about this issue in the building behind me. Some of you may also know that on the steps where we stand, thousands of citizens have come to voice their support for their Hometown Schools and for our children. The people of our state are speaking up and taking action on this issue. SO WE CAN'T STOP HERE.

I am so appreciative to the Legislature and our Governor for using a bipartisan approach that spends education dollars more equitably.... where they are needed most.

For my own district, the 1.4 million dollars we will receive gets applied immediately to student programs and resources, and we are grateful. But my community has been loud and clear in reminding me that we have been underfunded by 11 million to 13 million dollars EVERY YEAR for years. Parents and Community leaders were quick to point out that while everyone wants a rainy day fund to fall back on, for students in districts like mine, it's been raining for a long time.

The 'level up' funding is a golden drop of sunshine through that rain but we must keep going. I look forward to brighter days ahead, and I know I speak on behalf of many educators and students everywhere when I say this is progress and a big step in the right direction!

PHS Students Earn Honors In State STEM Competition

A team of Pottstown High School students took on the potentially economically devastating problem of the Spotted Lantern Fly (SLF) facing Pennsylvania. The team of Nada Elgendy, Abdel Elgendy, and William Levey, along with teacher /advisor Andrew Bachman, entered the 2021 PA Governor's STEM Competition, with the goal of providing a workable solution to one of Mother Nature's problems. They submitted the design, and research to the Governor's STEM competition in April. Their research and design efforts earned them a 4th place finish in the statewide competition. To combat the SLF infestation, scientists recommend scraping egg sacs off tree trunks in the affected area with a card. However, scraping and effectively collecting egg sacs poses challenges. The team designed the Spotted Lantern Fly Egg Sac Mitigator (SLFESM). The SLFESM allows homeowners and community members to mitigate SLF by safely, easily, efficiently scraping and collecting. The SLFESM allows for scraping, smearing, or smashing the egg sacs. They submitted the design, and The Governor's STEM Competition research to the Governor's STEM competition in April. challenges student teams from across the state to research, design, and present a device or project that can make the quality of life better for Pennsylvanians by accomplishing a series of practical tasks that can fulfill real-world needs.

This year's theme was "Improving Pennsylvania Through STEM". During the school year, teams of students designed and built solutions to real-world problems. Teams were required to work with a member of their local community, a business, or an educational entity to help create an authentic experience while also providing opportunities to learn more about careers in STEM.

Our team overcame the added challenges caused by distancing due to COVID and learned a great deal about how to coordinate efforts in order to solve problems. It is an experience that will serve them well in the work world, said Mr. Bachman. Click on the links below:

Earth Day Project a Middle School Success

Transforming the Pottstown Middle School courtyards from what Student Council Advisor Andrea Roberts described as "Garden Nightmare" to "GardZen" was an Earth Day project success. Roberts said, "Our council had an opportunity to meet outside of zoom for the first time in almost a year and they used their time to brainstorm this project from start to finish. The plan called for a team of over 50 students, teachers, administrators, and community mentors volunteering their time on a Saturday morning to clear, redesign and spread over 15 tons of mulch to transform both of the middle school courtyards." Principal Brian Hostetler, who was on hand to lend his muscle in moving the mulch, said, "I am very proud of our students, staff and community members for coming together to support our school. Their efforts will provide a beautiful area for outdoor education."

Story behind Pottstown Middle School's first musical is a real 'Beauty'

So when Stitt, who has worked as a substitute teacher in the district, realized the middle school didn't have the money to put on a spring musical— a staple of every other middle school in the region that she knew— it bothered her. "I decided to change that," she said.

Stitt got permission from the district to apply for a Disney grant that enables poorer schools to perform their shows without having to pay the licensing fee. Enter stage left, "Beauty and the Beast Jr." — a shortened adaptation for younger students. Even so, Stitt, who is a candidate for the Pottstown School Board, had no idea of the problems she might face.

Working around COVID restrictions, she auditioned the kids outside, in front of the school. She held rehearsals in the school parking lot, where she taped X's six feet apart on the pavement.

When school sports programs started up again in January, she got permission to move the theater production inside as well. Recognizing that facial expressions are key to acting, she got clear plastic masks for the actors. But then there was an issue with the microphones. The middle school had an array hanging from the ceiling, but that was more for choral performances. The equipment wouldn't pick up individuals, Stitt said.

When Johnny Corson, president of the Pottstown branch of the NAACP, learned about the latest glitch, he wanted to help. "Sometimes, people just need to know that they are somebody," he said. "I thought it would be good for their self-esteem. Not everyone is an athlete. We wanted to cheer them on. We wanted them to feel good about themselves." He knew others would want to help as well. The NAACP, the Pottstown Rotary Club, and a separate group of local business people donated \$500 each for a system of 16 wireless headset microphones that will be donated to the middle school afterward.

"We generally support children's education and literacy. Actually, anything to help kids is big in Rotary," said Brooke Martin, president of the local group. "Plus, it's something that can be used in the years to come to create a strong program."

"I can tell you," Stitt said, "45 students are a lot happier today because of what these groups did." Stitt found that the students—stagehands, actors and more—coalesced beyond what anyone expected. They supported each other and cheered each other on. "Kids that might never be friends with each other have become friends," she said. As she wrote in the program, "Theater friends become family, and I have seen this happen during our production. Every one of these actors is supporting and encouraging—even when they are in a 'teenager' mood!" Several kids involved in the production are on the autism spectrum. Some have anxiety and depression issues. "The play has given them an outlet." Through GoFundMe, more than \$400 was raised for costumes and sets, which she built herself.

Corson's son Matt, a paraprofessional who works with district students who have emotional or behavioral issues, lent his theatrical expertise, joining the group as producer. Johnny Corson's love of theater began when he was in fourth grade and played a Polynesian kid in the all-district musical, "South Pacific." The next year, he was a craps shooter in "Guys and Dolls." And so on. When he heard that the middle school wasn't doing musicals because of funding issues, "I was crushed," he said. "It brought me back to when I was in high school and there was talk about cutting the music program and the arts program. Back then, our group came together and went to a school board meeting and stood our ground." "Speaking personally, it helped me to get over self-confidence and self-image issues," Johnny Corson said. "To put yourself out there and not be worried about the judgments that may come. It teaches you to be comfortable with public speaking, with improvisational skills. You learn teamwork." Kids are "getting wrapped up in a character that is totally different from their everyday life. You can learn sympathy from that," he said.

Jahiem Pratt, an 8th grader who plays Gaston, said the production "gives off good energy. There's a lot of negativity in the school. This brings out the goodness. Everyone gets along."

Stitt's daughter Olivia, a 7th grader, plays Belle. "I just like sometimes pretending to be a different person," she said. "It helps me get out of my head."

Opening night is Friday, May 7, at 7 p.m. Additional performances are May 8, 9, 15 and 16 at 2 p.m. and May 14 at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$10.

Because COVID restrictions mean the auditorium can only be at 20 percent of capacity, tickets were only available through cast members. But now that cast members have put in their orders, a limited number of tickets are available for the public. Email Stitt at dstitt@pottstownk12.org or call her at 610-657-6842.

Meanwhile, the group is performing a filmed version to be streamed online. Those who can't get tickets — or grandparents who don't live nearby — can buy a ticket, pick from among a few dozen scheduled times, and watch on their computers.

Once a Trojan, Always a Trojan

Linford F. Moyer, 94 was the devoted husband of Violet M. Moyer for 72 years and an exemplary



father, grandfather and great-grandfather. His life was marked by his Christian faith and a cheerful radiance. Born in New Hanover Township in southeastern Pennsylvania in 1926, "Lin" was the son of Franklin E. Moyer and Alice R. Moyer. In his early years Lin attended a one-room school that housed eight grades, with two students in his grade. He began his lifelong career in public education at 16, while still a student at Pottstown High School, working after school and on Saturdays in the business office. During World War II, Lin served in the United States Navy as an aide to the Executive Officer aboard the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Princeton. After the war

in 1946, Lin returned to work for the Pottstown School District, while also attending night school at Temple University and the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, where he earned a degree in business. He married his wife Violet J. (nee Moyer) of Boyertown, Pennsylvania in 1948 and their son, Bruce Linford, was born in 1952. Lin guickly rose through the ranks of the Pottstown School District to become Assistant Superintendent for Business and served the district for 37 years. During his tenure, the district experienced growth and expansion, and Lin oversaw the design, financing and construction of four elementary schools and a new senior high school, as well as the renovation of all the district's schools. He saved taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars through innovative management practices, including the start-up of a sophisticated data processing center that was ahead of its time, earning revenue for the Pottstown School District through its services to many other school districts, municipalities and governmental authorities throughout Pennsylvania. His reputation as a skilled business administrator won him national recognition, electing him president of the Pennsylvania Association of School Business Officials in 1964 and the Association of School Business Official International in 1977. In 1980, Lin became the first full-time executive director of the Pennsylvania Association of School Business Officials (PASBO). Under his leadership, significant increases in school business training programs and association membership were witnessed. Following his retirement from PASBO in 1987, Lin served as vice president of Cadre Consulting Services, a national firm providing cash management services to school districts across the country. Throughout the 53 years spanning Lin's professional career, he was widely known for his integrity, intellect and his warmth in working with people. A tireless public servant, Lin also was an active volunteer and leader in numerous church and civic groups, including the governing boards and committees of New Hanover Lutheran Church in Gilbertsville, Pennsylvania and First Presbyterian Church in Vero Beach, Florida. He enjoyed playing tennis and all kinds of games, traveling and spending time with his family and celebrating their achievements. His personal motto was "Get Organized!"

A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR



Often times when we approach the end of something, we reflect on what has occurred. I am finding myself doing this currently as we approach the end of our Foundation's fiscal year. The one word that has been used time and time again to describe this year is unprecedented. What does that really mean?

Miriam Webster defines unprecedented as having no precedence, novel, unexampled. So, what was so novel about this past year for our Foundation? To answer this question, I am going to go back longer than 12 months. Let's go back and start with March 2020.

For the first time in our history, our donors responded to a specific call to action, the need for electronic devices for the students in the Pottstown School District. As you recall, one out of every four students did not have access to electronic devices that were needed to continue their education on line. YOU answered this call by contributing \$307,712 enabling

the purchase of 880 devices.

When the schools were closed due to the pandemic, some of our students did not have meals as many of them relied on the Pottstown School District to provide them with two meals per day. With the school closed, the food could not be distributed for a few weeks. YOU answered this call by donating funds to support a food drive initiated by Mrs. Mc Coy at the high school until the schools could restart the food distribution program.

When the school libraries were not open to access books for the students to continue their reading, YOU provided the funds to purchase electronic books that enabled our students to access and read online.

These are just three examples of "unprecedented" acts that YOU helped fund. During these 14 months, YOU provided \$860,057 in donations during this "unprecedented" time to help level the educational playing field for the Pottstown School District. At the end of the 2020/21 fiscal year, you will have provided funding of more than \$500,000 per year for two years in a row, an "unprecedented" accomplishment.

In our August Newsletter, I will share the annual report for the fiscal year 2020/21. This is just a teaser of things to come.

Lastly, I apologize to all of you who feel that the word unprecedented is overused. It is unprecedented that I use it so often. Thank you all for all that you do to help our 3,200 students in the Pottstown School District. We appreciate your support and hope that you continue to support our students as we move forward.

FOUNDATION FOR POTTSTOWN EDUCATION RESTRICTED FUNDS POLICY

All funds donated to the Foundation for Pottstown Education are used to support programs and services that enrich the education of the students in the Pottstown School District. As there are expenses in the administration and overseeing of the funding process, 90% of the funds given as restricted contributions, other than to the Scholarship account, are used as the donor requests with 10% being used for the administrative costs. 100% of gifts given to the Scholarship account are deposited in the assigned scholar-

ship. An administrative fee of 10% is applied from only the realized gain of the scholarship investments at the end of the fiscal year.

The event started with a program showcasing the impact that the Foundation has had on the students, alumni, district and community. Special guest speakers shared their thoughts how the Foundation has made an impact in leveling the educational playing field for the Pottstown School District.

Sue Yocom, Special Events Chair for the Foundation welcomed everyone for attending. Recognizing what the past year had seen, she thanked the guests for attending the event even through masks and social distancing we were able to host this fund raiser. Other committee members include, Kenil Patel, Lori Pence, Elizabeth Peters and Alison Scott.

Mr. Robert Decker, PHS Mathematics Teacher and PHS Musical Producer and Stage Manager introduced the cast of Godspell. He shared that the Foundation has been a sponsor of the musicals for five years and this year helped to make the live streaming of the event possible.

Andrea shared that the Foundation provided funding to the Library to purchase podcast equipment. THE HILL SCHOOL STUDENT PHILANTHROPY COUNCIL SUPPORTS FPE WITH GRANT



The Foundation for Pottstown Education was recently awarded a grant to support pod cast equipment in the Pottstown Middle School by the Hill School Student Philanthropy Council.

The grant totals \$579 and is earmarked to fund podcast equipment that will be housed in the Pottstown Middle School Library.

The Hill School's Student Philanthropy Council (SPC) was established in 2008-09 thanks to a generous donation by the late Mr. Charles Frank III '59 P'88 '90 and his wife, Betty.

The Franks wanted to establish the program at Hill to enable Hill students to carry out their shared belief that young people should volunteer their time and efforts to benefit their communities that will then establish lifelong philanthropic interests.

In 2012, through the Franks' leadership and the generosity of several other donors, The Student Philanthropy Council became an endowed program at the School with the establishment of The Student Philanthropy Council Endowment in honor of Kay and David Dougherty (Hill's former headmaster from 1993-2012 and his wife). Each year, the SPC awards \$16,000 worth of grants to local non-profit organizations to help fund those entities' programs (see below). Each fall, interested organizations are encouraged to submit a grant application to the SPC. Throughout the school year. the members of SPC have weekly meetings evaluating each proposal. The proposal for the podcast equipment came to the Foundation from Pottstown Middle School Librarian, Andrea Roberts. Podcasting is necessary at the MS as it is the end result of everything that the teachers and administrators try to accomplish in daily lessons. While podcasts create an end result, the process is really where the magic happens. While teachers offer guidance along the

way, the students are the ones who are creating the important content that they will be speaking to, leaning how to edit. Learning that mistakes are ok and rethinking is part of the process. Podcasting is not only about speaking, but about listening as well.

The Foundation and the Pottstown School District are truly thankful to the students in the Philanthropy Council for their support and their donation.

"Of the projects identified for the elementary, middle, and the high schools, the Council was most excited about the middle school STEAM lab. Providing an area of creativity and collaboration is essential given the impact the pandemic has had on student connection."

PHS AWARDS 91 SCHOLASHIPS TO THE CLASS OF 2021

On Tuesday May 11, 91 Scholarships were presented to the graduating seniors of the Class of 2021. More than \$50,400 was presented in the form of cash scholarships to 49 separate seniors. The donors of the Foundation for Pottstown Education provided the funding for 49 of these awards totaling \$38,250. Three more awards will be presented during the graduation ceremony to the Class Valedictorian and the Salutatorian bringing the total cash awarded to the seniors from the Foundation donors to almost \$40,400.

The awards were presented virtually with the students, families and friends being able to view the announcements on a Facebook live presentation. Pottstown Senior High School Principal, Mrs. Danielle McCoy was the moderator for the ceremony which also had donors, community members and staff of the School District and Foundation for Pottstown Education as the presenters of the awards. This is the second year that the ceremony was held virtually.

The Foundation donors also provide funding for 35 Elemen-

tary School and two Middle School awards. These awards will be presented at separate events with recipients to be announced at a later date. Combining the Senior, Middle School and Elementary School awards, the Foundation provides 88 awards totaling \$42,400 for the 2020/2021 academic year.

FOUNDATION FOR POTTSTOWN EDUCATION RECIEVES FUNDING TO PROVIDE FIVE NEW SCHOLARSHIPS

The Foundation for Pottstown Education's Scholarship Fund has had a tremendous growth this past year adding five new scholarships for the graduating seniors of Pottstown High School. Two of the five were awarded for the first time to the Class of 2020, one additional award was offered to the Class of 2021 and two more awards will be added for the Class of 2022.

These awards are the Ellen Eisele Be the Change of Tomorrow Award and the Leslie Freese Betz Award were awarded for the first time to the Class of 2020. This year the Linford F. Moyer and Family Scholarship was added to these two awards. For the Class of 2022 the Judith Allean Wolf, Class of 1958 Scholarship and the Moyer Performing Arts Award will be presented for the first time.

The Ellen Eisele Be the Change of Tomorrow Award was established by Wes and Rachel Eisele in honor of Wes' mother, Ellen as she retired from 29 years of teaching, 26 of which were in the Barth Elementary School in the Pottstown School District. Ellen retired at the end of the 2019 academic year. She is an Alum of Bridgewater-Raritan West High School, in New Jersey. After high school, p Ellen attended Kutztown University.

This award will be awarded to a graduating Pottstown School District student(s) who demonstrate the following criteria:

- Their actions and behaviors reflect strong integrity and character.
- They demonstrate kindness towards their peers, school and community.
- They possess leadership qualities.
- They display a positive and creative attitude.
- Their demeanor exhibits peacemaker qualities.
- They must be actively pursuing a passion.
- They must be actively pursuing higher education, a 2-year community college, 4-year

- University or any tech/ vocational school.
- They must graduate with a GPA of 3.0 or higher.

Leslie L Freese-Betz was a proud graduate from the Pottstown Senior High School Class of 1988 and also graduated from Pennsylvania Business Institute. Leslie developed scoliosis at the age of 14, requiring a spinal fusion. While the surgery was successful, Leslie developed restrictive lung disease due to the curvature of her spine. She managed her problems guite well for many years but eventually the disease required her to be placed on oxygen. Unfortunately on January 16, 2020 Leslie received her "golden wings" and became a blessed angel to watch over the people she loved so much. Leslie's husband and families were very important to her and she always put everyone else first before herself. She touched so many people in her short time on this earth with her compassion, love, her constant



beautiful smile and infectious laugh.

Leslie's husband and family created this scholarship as they felt it would be a tremendous honor to her to continue her "gift of love and compassion" to others. This scholarship is to be awarded to a deserving student of the school she loved so much who decides to pursue a career in the medical field, with special consideration to students pursuing a four-year college education. The student must have a 3.75+ GPA. The medical field was selected because of Leslie's medical history and because the family felt this is surely what she would want. She also became an organ donor because of her passion for helping others and to contribute to researching problems similar to hers.

The Linford F. Moyer and Family Scholarship has been endowed by the family of Linford F. Moyer, a former business official with the Pottstown School District. This award will be presented annually to a senior at Pottstown Senior High School who matriculates to an accredited post-secondary education institution to study business management.

Linford Moyer, at the age of 16, began his lengthy career in the Pottstown School District working in the Business Office while still a student. After graduation from high school in 1944, Mr. Moyer served in the United States Navy as an aide to the Executive Officer aboard the U.S.S. Princeton. In 1946, Mr. Moyer returned to the Pottstown School District and attended night school at Temple University and the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, earning a degree in Business. He managed the business affairs of

the Pottstown School District for 37 years, last serving as the Assistant Superintendent for Business. Recognized by his peers as a school business professional and leader, Mr. Moyer was elected President of the Pennsylvania Association of Business Officials in 1964 and President of the Association of School Business Officials International in 1977. In 1980 he became the first Executive Director of the Pennsylvania School Business Officials. Mr. Moyer passed away on April 23, 2021.

The Moyer Performing Arts Award was established by the Very Reverend Michael D. Mover, PHS class of 1985 because he was grateful for the role that the performing arts had in his formation as a good citizen and an adult in our society. After Moyer's graduation, he attended Montgomery County Community College, the University of Maine, the Bangor Theological Seminary and Nashotah House Seminary. He is currently the Rector/Priest at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Berlin Maryland.

The Moyer Performing Arts Award will be given to a member of the graduating class who has contributed their gifts to the performing arts at Pottstown High School. The person receiving this award will have been active in at least two of the areas of performing arts – band, chorus, and drama.

The Judith Allean Wolf, Class of 1958 Scholarship Award has been endowed by Judith Allean Wolf, a member of the Pottstown High School Class of 1958. This award will be given to a graduating Pottstown School District student who will attend the Bloomsburg University majoring in

Speech and Language Pathology, Audiology or Special Education. Judy started this award as a way to give back to the Pottstown High School.

After graduating from Pottstown High School, Judy was accepted and attended Bloomsburg State Teachers College, now Bloomsburg University. Her major was Speech Pathology. She selected this major on a suggestion from her high school friend, Mary Ann Buckwalter Woods. Judith started her career in Speech Pathology in January 1962 working for the Chester County Public Schools as an itinerant Speech Pathologist, In 1965 she moved to California. After 22 years in this career, Judy resigned in 1987 from the New Haven Unified School District and then enrolled at H and R Block Tax School to begin her career as a tax preparer. She continues her private tax preparation business today.
