


Partnership with NAACP puts students on Road To Reading

Pottstown School Board adopts zero tax hike 5th straight year

At the May 16 board meeting, the \$84.8 million budget was adopted by a vote of 7-0. Board members Steve Kline and Deborah Spence were absent.

And while the 41.96 mill tax rate will remain the same for the fifth straight year, some tax bills may look a little different nonetheless.

During last year's budget adoption, the board voted to deliver on its pledge to return money to taxpayers with some of the increased state aid the district received, and that was done by providing an \$87 rebate to all property owners, which reached several thousand people.

However, that method provided no financial relief to renters.

This year, the board is taking a different approach with its tax relief, targeting low-income residents and renters by "piggybacking" onto an existing state program targeting that same group.

The Foundation for Pottstown Education was recently awarded a \$60,330 grant from the Exton-based Justamere Foundation to enable the purchase of a diverse collection of books for all six Pottstown School District libraries. This grant will provide more than 2,700 books underscoring the commitment to fostering inclusivity and representation within the Pottstown School District.

State Rep Joe Ciresi speaks up for public education



Thanks to our State Representative Joe Ciresi for speaking on the floor of the PA House of Representatives advocating for public education and calling for the passage of House Bill 2370. The HB2370 was successfully passed and now moves on to the Senate.

House Bill 2370 would put into law the recommendations of a bipartisan commission that found Pennsylvania must spend an additional \$5.1 billion to erase school funding disparities that a state court ruled unconstitutional. The legislation would also end what critics call gross overpayments to cyber charter schools and set minimum salaries for teachers.





Middle School library 10,000 stories and counting

The Pottstown Middle School Library has been a busy place this year. Librarian Andrea Roberts happily reports that over 10,000 books have been checked out so far this year by students and staff. Roberts said, "The library is of tremendous value to our district and the students. It holds materials for everyone and this year, by tracking each month I found circulations reaching above 10,000. We surpassed where we were last year. I was able to add thousands of books to our collection to meet student reading interests." She paid specific attention to who materials were circulating to, and how they were used.

"I noticed a need to have books in languages other than English available to our students. As quickly as books written in Spanish were purchased and put on the shelves they were quickly checked out. Now we have more books on the shelves for students who read in multiple languages. Early in the school year a student checked out two copies of Charlotte's Web, one in English the other in Spanish. The student said, this is my mom's favorite book and now she can read it to me."

Roberts noted, "Our Middle School library is where students gather for programs, classes, and clubs. Colleagues are in and out of the library to collaborate and find resources. Our library is available to students and staff every morning, throughout the day, and after school. Having an operating school library provides daily access to high-quality materials to students. So many heartwarming moments

happen in our school libraries."








Student Club Lends A Helping Hand

She has kept tabs on how her students progress not just through high school, but college, and beyond. She is the first to volunteer herself to step up and get the job done. She will make sure she masters the task to deliver it to her team. Her students always show progress in their scores.

Pottstown High School

Mr. Woodley is constantly evolving as a teacher. He reflects on each lesson and works tirelessly to incorporate relevant and interactive strategies to engage his learners. He continually designs Escape Rooms for his students along with other teachers in his hallway.

In Personal Finance, he designed a classroom money economy where students use Personal Finance money to pay bills, such as chair rent, cable bills, and water bills but they can also use it to purchase tickets to sporting events or culinary lunches. One of the more elaborate games is the Cash Fall Game where two students stand at the bottom of the stairs with buckets and the other students throw money over the rail and the students at the bottom get to keep what they catch for their personal finance bank accounts.

His MIS Students created a Semester at Sea Voyage utilizing all of the MIS Skills. This project requires students to make spreadsheets, databases, and websites of the voyage that they have mapped out. This year, the focus of the voyage is heritage, with them adding to their voyage each month based on the culture being celebrated that month. For Example, March will be Irish heritage and they will research popular landmarks, languages spoken, currency, and cultural celebrations in this region of the world. Students then work their way through each other's voyages, learning about other countries that they did not visit on their voyage. His MIS students, known as the MISfits, also provide in-house IT support for teachers in the building.

Some of the other exciting ideas are his semester-long project Rollercoaster Tycoon and multiple vocabulary games that also involve seasonal themes. Students play Monopoly in Personal Finance where they keep track of their money with a check register and they write checks to pay for their purchases throughout the game. He uses movies and games, such as Buddy the Elf and Super Mario to create assignments that are engaging and entertaining. He also created a review game based on the television show Squid Games for Personal Finance.

In 2015, Dave Woodley began the Trojan Man Club. This club continues to grow each year. Dave has mentored more than 50 students. He remains in contact with many of them, helping with college and/or obtaining jobs following graduation. They have raised money for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society and the Breast Cancer Coalition. He is also a member of the PBIS team and the ERT team at the high school.

He cares about all students. He works with the Special Education Department and ESL teacher to ensure that all students who enter his classroom are welcomed and challenged. He approaches each day with excitement and an admirable energy. Dave is a valued team member, working with his peers to make PHS an enjoyable place to work. Lastly, Mr. Woodley is a graduate of PSD and is proud to give back to his community.



James Earl Rodgers – Class of 1953 - Retired Pottstown Police Chief James Earl Rodgers of Pottstown passed away peacefully on April 9, 2024, in King of Prussia, Pennsylvania. Born in Williamston, North Carolina on September 9, 1934, to the late Violetta Leola (Biggs)

and Osborn Rodgers, he was the oldest of four children. He relocated with his family to Pottstown, Pa on September 1, 1947. Jim or Earl as he was called by many was educated in the North Carolina and Pottstown School System and graduated from Pottstown High School in 1953.



age at the Second Baptist Church located in Pottstown, Pa. Later, he went on to earn an associate degree in the Administration of Justice and Community Service from the Pennsylvania State University in 1975. In 1981 he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in the Administration of Justice also from the Pennsylvania State University. In 1954 he joined the United States Air Force where he rose to the rank of Staff Sergeant within the U.S. Air Force Training Command. He later served at bases in New York, New Mexico, Washington DC, and Wyoming. During his military career which spanned from 1954 to 1958 (active) he was tasked with the training of maintenance and support crews for those assigned to Lockheed U-2 spy planes. He later served in the reserves from 1958 to 1962. After serving his country Jim was Pottstown's police chief from 1974 to 1991, after serving for five years as a sergeant and one year as the captain of the force. As a part of his law enforcement training, he achieved the rank of expert marksman. As Chief, he created several lasting and impactful initiatives. He instituted a Crisis Intervention Service, a Crime Prevention Unit, and a Police Award Program. He was instrumental in the development of a cooperative instructional program between the police department and local school districts. Chief Rodgers also created an honor guard within the Pottstown Police Department to represent the Borough of Pottstown. He is credited with updating and utilizing the latest computer technology and police communications system of its time. Himself a recipient of the department's medal of valor award, Rodgers also received recognition from the International Police Chiefs Association, the Fraternal Order of Police, the National Organization of Black Law Executives, the Jewish War Veterans and a United States Navy recruiting award, as well as numerous other community and national law enforcement honors. Upon retiring and ending his career in law enforcement, he acted on his passion to help others by establishing the Interfaith Community Development Corporation. The goal of this organization was to assist low income and families in need with securing affordable housing. This included the building of new property, the rehabilitation of existing properties, and courses on credit, borrowing, and overall financial literacy. He spent 6 years with ICDC. For the last nearly 10 years of his professional career Earl was employed by the Vanguard Group in Malvern PA.

Neil Raden - Class of 1970, and a 1974 graduate of Webster University in St. Louis. He was a



mathematician, an industry analyst, and a widely published author and speaker. Known as the father of data warehousing, he was a recognized authority of AI Ethics and founded his own company, Hired Brains Research, in 1985.


